The Death of John Brownson. There died, in New Orleans, March 28, 1857, John Brownson, aged 55 years and 15 days Mr. Rrownson was a native of Opelousas, born March 8, 1832. He was the son of Caroline Stell and John Brownson, Sr., one of the most promi-nent members of the Louisiana Bar and law partner of ex-Gov. Joshus G. Is. ker. Mr. Brownson spent his early youth in Louisiana, but in his boyhood Young their states of the famous Pomone Farm on Long Island, Queen's county, N. Y. After several years' schooling in Brooks, lyn, he was sent to Yale where he was a classmate of Senator R. L. Gibon and graduated. On leaving college he went to Europe. Returning home after two years of travel, he re-mained a short time in New York, when he determined to pay a visit to his native State. His stay here was permanent! Having inherited a fortune from his parents he invested in large sugar plantations, and at one time was one of the most prominent planters in the parishes of St. Mary and Terrebonne. In 1856 he married the widow of Anthony Wayne Baker, youngest daughter of the late Gabriel Luclaire Fuselier, the wealthiest planter of St. Mary at the time. Mr. Brownson raised a very large family; also, his stepson, Joshus G. Baker, the present Judge of the Criminal Court of New Orleans, Section B. Mr. Brownson, like the most o: our planters of the old regime, failed and his beautiful plantation was sacrificed to meet his liabilities. The vicissitudes of fortune, combined with his ill health, hastened his death. He leaves n devoted wife, three daughters and eight sons to mourn his untimely death, One of his daughters, Mrs. J. S. Martel, is now a resident of Opelousas. God has seen fit to call from this transitory life one that was honored, loved and

steemed by all those that knew him. He was an affectionate husband, a devoted father, and his generous heart was the mirror of his noble soul. May his name never be oblicerated from the history of our State .- Opelousas Courier, April 2.
