Winter Wheat succeeds best on burst ground, but also succeeds well on a free miliow soil, if in good heart; land that has a gradual slope is best for it—On burst ground 1 bushel of seed to the acre, unless sown on or before the 12th August—when 7 pecks may answer. Winter Wheat ought not to be sown after the 1st September. The land should be rolled when the Wheat is sown, and early in the Spring.
