

FORMER SENATOR MURPHY J. FOSTER IS LAID AT REST

Funeral Cortège Is More Than Mile Long at Franklin.

Franklin, La., June 13.--Funeral services were held here this afternoon with imposing ceremonies for former United States Senator Murphy J. Foster, long a notable figure in the state's political life, who died Sunday morning.

The funeral cortège left the family residence at Dixie plantation at 4 o'clock and proceeded to the Methodist Church, where services were held, the Rev. John Foster officiating. The ritual at the grave was under the auspices of Franklin Lodge No. 57, P. and A. M., of which Senator Foster was a past master. Pallbearers were Robert C. Milling, H. H. Gates, John M. Cafery, Judge Percy Saint, Paul Kramer, John C. Lewis, T. J. Foster and C. J. Boatner.

Prominent men from all parts of the state were present for the funeral, the procession being more than a mile long. Every parish was represented among the mourners. The floral offerings were numerous.

Out of respect for Senator Foster's memory, the Twenty-third Judicial District Court adjourned for the day.

Convention to Honor Foster's Memory
