Miss Sarah J. Johnson.

Woodville, Miss., July 8.—Miss Sarah J. Johnson died here at Glenwood, the family residence, in the 76th year of her age. She was a daughter of Hon. William Johnson, a pioneer member of the Mississippi bar, and of Elizabeth Randolph. On the paternal side she was a niece of the late Governor and United States Senator Henry Johnson, of Louisiana, and a cousin of Cave Johnson, of Tennessee, who was postmaster general of the United States during President Polk's administration. On the maternal side she was descended from the noted Randolph family. She lived a useful Christian life, having been a member of the Presbyterian church since early childhood. She leaves quite a large number of relatives, among them a sister, Mrs. P. M. Stockett, of this place. Mrs. Thos. G. Stockett, recently deceased, was also a sister.

Two Deaths at Abbeville.

Abbeville, La., July 8.—Mr. Nathan Beer, aged 35 years, died here night before last and was carried to the Lafayette Jewish cemetery for interment.
