MRS. BARBARA McCOLLOUGH.

The funeral of Mrs. Barbara A. McCollough, who died Sunday, will take place this afternoon from her home, 607 Windermere avenue. Services will be conducted by Rev. David Craighead, of Waverly Presbyterian Church; Rev. John P. Campbell, of Faith Church, and Rev. Thomas Springer. The pallbearers will be Messrs. A. Howard McCollough, William Donoho, William B. Fuller, Frank S. Fuller, Augustus Beldorf and Clarence Lewis.

Mrs. McCollough was the daughter of John Minnick, who with his two brothers, Charles and Michael Minnick, formed a trio of fife and drum players in the defense of Baltimore in the War of 1812. She was one of the first members of the Sunday-school class of Faith Presbyterian Church, at Broadway and Gay streets. She was 73 years old. She was the widow of Andrew J. McCollough, who died 14 years ago. Her death is said to have resulted from a fall which occurred about five weeks ago. Prior to that she had been an invalid for 10 years.

Mrs. McCollough is survived by the following children: Miss Mary B. and Mr. John A. McCollough, of Baltimore, and Charles E. McCollough, of Easton, Pa. Burial will be in Baltimore Cemetery.

MRS. SARAH B. BRUCE.

News was received in Baltimore yesterday of the death in Pittsburg Sunday of Mrs. Sarah Beveridge Bruce, mother in law of Rev. Dr. John B. Wilson, formerly of Baltimore. Mrs. Bruce died of paralysis at the home of Rev. Dr. Wilson, who is pastor of Grant Street Reformed Presbyterian Church, Pittsburg.

Born in Philadelphia in 1832, Mrs. Bruce's family moved to Canonsburgh, Pa., in 1835. Mrs. Bruce's father, Rev. Dr. Thomas Beveridge, being elected to a professorship in the Associate Seminary. In 1855 the seminary was moved to Xenia, Ohio, and Dr. Beveridge and his family moved there, where their daughter Sarah remained until her marriage to Rev. William Bruce, who was then pastor of First Associate Church, Baltimore. They remained in this city until 1873, when Dr. Bruce was elected to fill the chair made vacant by the death of his father in law, Dr. Beveridge.

Mrs. Bruce was left a widow in 1880, but still made her home in Xenia until the marriage of her only daughter to Rev. Dr. Wilson in 1892. She then spent four years in Columbus, Ohio, where Dr. Wilson had his first pastorate. In 1896 Dr. Wilson was called to the pulpit his father in law occupied for so many years in Baltimore and Mrs. Bruce went back to spend the last 18 years of her life in the manse where so many of her earlier years had been spent.

A month ago Dr. Wilson accepted a call to Grant Street Reformed Presbyterian Church, of Pittsburg. Mrs. Bruce leaves three sons, James, Thomas and William, and one daughter, Bessie. She will be buried in the family burying ground at Xenia tomorrow.

WILLIAM KEY.

Word has been received in this city of the death of Mr. William Key in New Orleans Saturday of heart trouble. Mr. Key was about 63 years old. A brother of Mrs. George C. Jenkins, of this city; of Mrs. Henry Daingerfield, of Alexandria, Va., and of Messrs. Edward and Henry J. Key, he is survived also by his widow, a daughter of the late Dr. William H. Baltzell. He also leaves a daughter, Mrs. Lawrence B. Elbert, of Brooklyn, N. Y., and three sons, William B. Key, New Orleans; Philip Barton Key, of New York, and Sewell Key, of Frederick.

Mr. Key was a direct descendant of Francis Scott Key.

MRS. ISAAC ELLINGER.

The funeral of Mrs. Isaac Ellinger took place yesterday morning from the Catholic Church of Sts. Philip and James, where a requiem high mass was celebrated by Rev. Hugh Monaghan. Assisting in the sanctuary were Rev. F. X. Brady, Rev. James Nolan and Rev. J. E. Wade. The Gregorian chant was sung by an augmented choir under the direction of Miss Jane Eppley. Mrs. Laura Wason, widow of James Wason, former editor of the Hagerstown Mail, died yesterday at the Church Home and Infirmary, North Broadway. She was 87 years old and was a daughter of the late Dr. William Bruce Locke, of St. Mary's county. Rev. William L. Burroughs and Mr. Abby Burroughs, both of Mechanicsville, and Mr. H. Bruce Burroughs, of T. B. Prince George's county, are nephews, and Miss Virginia Burroughs and Mrs. Laura W. Holmes, both of Mechanicsville, are nieces.

Burial will be in All Faith Cemetery, St. Mary's county.

SAMUEL SALOMON.
