HEADQUARTERS SECOND BRIGADE,
Louisiana Volunteer State Troops,
New Orleans, February 20, 1862. }

[General Orders No. 6.]

1. In obedience to Order No. 19 from the Major General,
Commanders of Regiments will immediately prepare for
active service in the field, and assemble their respective
commands on their usual parade grounds on SATURDAY
MORNING NEXT, the first day of March, 1862, at 8
o'clock, promptly, and at once report to these head-
quarters.

2. Commanding officers will make the necessary
requisitions on the Brigade Quartermaster to equip their
companies fully for camp service, and the General com-
manding calls the especial attention of his officers to the
importance of seeing that knapsacks are lightly packed,
the contents to be restricted according to the regulations,
and for the purpose of increasing the company load by
the saving of rations, each company should forgo but one
meal. The amount of officers' baggage must also be limited
to articles of actual necessity, and all camp furniture
should be arranged to fold up. Captains of companies will
be required to furnish duplicate muster rolls.

3. Commanding officers of regiments, battalions and
companies are charged, respectively, with the execution
of this order.

GENERAL ORDERS No. 10.

1.—All applications for certificates of exemption from
militia duty must be made to the Surgeon or Assistant
Surgeon of the Beat where the applicant resides, in con-
formity with section 41 of the new militia law.

2.—Colonels of regiments will proceed immediately to
appoint their Surgeons and Assistant Surgeons, and direct
them to organize their departments, as no certificates of
exemption will be recognized unless emanating from
them—or, in case where no Regimental Surgeon has been
qualified, then from the Brigade Surgeon.

GOVERNOR'S PROCLAMATION.

EXECUTIVE OFFICE,
New Orleans, Feb. 24, 1862. }

The President of the Confederate States having issued
his proclamation setting apart FRIDAY, the 28th day of
February, as a day of fasting, humiliation and prayer,
now therefore do I, THOMAS O. MOORE, Governor of
the State of Louisiana, call upon the people of this State
and the reverend clergy, duly to observe such day, or in
case it may not be possible to observe that day in distant
parts of the State, I do request the clergy in such por-
tions to set apart some other day.

It is most becoming at this time that we should bow in
humiliation before the God of battles, without whose aid
victory is less to be desired than defeat, and beseech him
to extend to us the blessings he has already vouchsafed
us, and to endue us with the Christian virtues of fortit-
ude, self-sacrifice, and patience in adversity, and mod-
esty, humility and generosity in the day of triumph.
Let us not forget while we rely upon divine help for the
success which the justice of our cause leads us to expect,
that the ways of God are inscrutable to men, and even
whom he loveth he chastiseth.
