Wimberly Named Speaker, Senator Lindsey President Pro Tem

Tallieu Elected Clerk After performing the preliminary functions as clerk, Mr. Stoker stepped aside and Emile Tallieu of New Orleans, who has served as assistant clerk of the House for 30 years, was elected clerk by acclamation. Mr. Tallieu saw first service in the House of Representatives as a page when he was 11 years old. Other House officers elected without opposition are: A. J. Thomas, sergeant-at-arms; James Horton, former member of the House from Red River parish, doorkeeper, and E. L. Loeb of Opelousas, postmaster. In addition to Secretary Cason, other officers of the Senate elected are Joseph Messina, sergeant-at-arms; Wingate White, doorkeeper, and W. W. Smith, postmaster. The Senate designated Senator Isom J. Guillory of St. Landry parish, and the House named Representative C. A. Riddle of Avoyelles parish to serve with the attorney-general as members of the legislative bureau. All bills are sent to the legislative bureau before final passage to have their constitutionality passed on.

Mrs. Holland Sworn In The oath of office to the first woman member of Louisiana's Legislature, Mrs. Doris Lindsey Holland, was administered individually by Secretary Cason on the motion of Senator Jules G. Fisher of Jefferson parish.

Mrs. Holland is the widow of the late Senator Thomas Holland, and represents the parish of Tangipahoa. Livingston and St. Helena. Mrs. Holland was elected in the general election April 21, being named the Democratic candidate by the district committee in the place of her husband who died after being renominated in the Democratic primary January 21.

After Mrs. Holland took the oath, the other 37 senators were sworn in a body. Lieutenant-Governor-Elect Long, who stood near the secretary of the Senate, congratulated Mrs. Holland.

Committees Named Organization committees were created today by the House and Senate which will determine the number of committee clerkships, pages, etc. The Senate organization committee is composed of Senators Isom J. Guillory, chairman; F. E. Delouhou-saye, vice-chairman; A. A. Fredericks, Harvey Peltier and Leo Terzia.

The personnel of the House organization committee follows: Speaker Wimberly and Representatives M. J. Ficiola and C. A. Morvant, both of Lafourche parish; Y. C. Spinks of Tangipahoa parish; Edmund G. Burke of New Orleans; Guy H. Holloway of Union parish; Clarence J. Savoie of Assumption parish and H. W. Letissier of Catahoula parish.

Representatives Stich of Orleans and Morvant of Lafourche will serve as administration leaders in the House, it was agreed today. The floor leadership in the Senate, it is said, will be divided between Senators Lindsey and Isom J. Guillory of St. Landry parish.

Leche Pleased Governor-Elect Leche and Governor Noe witnessed the organization of the House and Senate. They mingled with the members and the spectators.

Governor-Elect Leche expressed himself as pleased with the harmony existing in both houses before leaving the capitol to check his final draft of the radio speech in which he outlined the policies of his administration.

The name of Representative Wimberly was placed in nomination by Representative J. W. Ethridge of Grant parish, and was seconded by Representative Frank J. Stich of the Fifth Ward of New Orleans. Representative S. Allen Beaudin of Avoyelles parish then moved that the nominations be closed and that Mr. Wimberly be declared elected by acclamation. This was done.

Senator Lindsey was nominated for president pro tempore of the Senate by Senator Harvey A. Peltier of Lafourche parish and the second came from Senator Isom J. Guillory of St. Landry parish. The motion that nominations be closed and Senator Lindsey declared elected by acclamation was made by Senator Nicholas G. Carbajal of the Third Ward of New Orleans.

THOUSANDS GOING TO STATE CAPITAL FOR INAUGURATION

New Orleanians Will Travel to Baton Rouge by Bus, Train and Auto

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nie will follow the flags. The police will be in new summer uniforms of dark blue coats, lightweight, grey trousers and leatherette caps.

A detachment of 125 New Orleans Naval Reserves under the command of Lieutenant-Commander Neville Levy boarded the destroyer Subchek here Monday afternoon and sailed for Baton Rouge to participate in the parade.

The 48 members of the faculty and the 90-piece band of Warren Easton High school, from which Judge Leche was graduated in 1917, will attend the inauguration. F. Gordon Eberle, principal of the school, said the faculty and band members will leave in four busses for Baton Rouge at 7 a. m. today.

A special holiday for this school had been authorized by the Orleans parish school board, he said, prior to State Superintendent Harris' declaration of a statewide school holiday. All Catholic schools, including Loyola university, within the archdiocese of New Orleans, will be closed today. Tulane university will have classes as usual.

Mayor Declares Holiday Mayor T. Semmes Walmsley Monday declared a holiday here for today in accordance with the proclamation issued by Governor Noe. City employees were paid their salaries for the first half of May to enable them to attend the inauguration. Virtually all city business will be suspended as city employees go to the capital.

Commissioners Joseph P. Skelly, Fred A. Earhart, A. Miles Pratt and Frank R. Gomila Monday announced they will attend. Though the Choctaw Club will not "concentrate" its membership for the Baton Rouge trip, ward units will send 1500 to 2000 members in individual groups, Ulic J. Burke, secretary of the club, said Monday. The groups will assemble separately for the parade in Baton Rouge.

Special Trains to Run The Illinois Central will operate four special trains out of New Orleans at 10-minute intervals beginning at 7 a. m. today. One train will leave Baton Rouge on its return trip at 4 p. m., one at about 11:30 p. m., following the ball, and the others at intermediate hours.

A special Louisiana and Arkansas Railway train will leave at 7:30 a. m. and return here about 7 p. m., officials of that railroad said. Equipment is at hand to supply all necessary extra sections on regular bus schedules to Baton Rouge, according to Teche Greyhound Lines authorities. In addition, 11 busses have been chartered for special purposes; other special busses will operate from other sections of the state.

Busses will carry to Baton Rouge the New Orleans Police Band, Warren Easton High School Band and faculty, the Celotex Band from Marrero, the Crescent City Post, American Legion Band, and delegations from the Fifth Ward.

Several planes have been chartered to make the inauguration trip, according to attendants at Shushan Airport and Wedell-Williams Airport.

Trading to Suspend The New Orleans Cotton Exchange will suspend trading today at 12 noon until 12:05 p. m. at the time of the inauguration of Governor-Elect Richard W. Leche. A delegation of exchange members headed by the president, Charles E. Fenner, will go to Baton Rouge for the ceremonies.

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two shots at the fleeing man. They took him to Charity hospital after he fell wounded.

Loot Recovered The entire loot of two robberies in Harahan, four packages of cigarettes, 30 cigars, a half-pint of whiskey and \$6, was found on Nelson when he was searched by the officers.

Nelson admitted breaking into St. Cyr's bar and restaurant and stealing \$8, then breaking into the Montz Sandwich shop, both in Harahan, where the liquor and tobacco were stolen, Marshal Contrado said.

He used a bent tire iron to pry open windows in the two places and to break the St. Cyr restaurant's cash register.

Nelson was seen filling his pockets with cigarettes in the last place he robbed by an unidentified bakery delivery boy from New Orleans, who notified Marshal Contrado at his home, a half block from the scene of the robberies.

Pursued by Officers Contrado summoned Daura, and together they went to the sandwich shop, approaching it from the front door. As they entered, the robber fled out of the back door, and ran around the block. Contrado and Daura also ran around the block, in the opposite direction to that taken by Nelson.

Shot in Flight "He came running toward us, not seeing us," Contrado said Monday night. "So I put Daura across the street, and walked toward him and grabbed him by the shirt. He broke away from me and ran down the highway. Both of us shouted to him to stop and to throw up his hands, but he kept running, waving and zig-zagging a little, so we both shot twice at him and he fell down and didn't get up any more."

One bullet entered the back and came out the front of the abdomen. Another went through his right hand.

A letter, addressed to "Joseph Miller, General Delivery, New Orleans," was found on his person, but he refused to reveal his identity until the orderly recognized him. A straight razor, in a holster, was found concealed beneath his shirt. It was the only weapon he had.

Nelson at first refused to let doctors perform an emergency operation, but later Monday night asked them to do so. His condition, however, was too serious at the time to permit an operation, physicians said.

NOE IS HONORED ON FINAL DAY AT GOVERNOR'S DESK

Chest of Silver Among Gifts Presented Retiring Executive

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(Special to The Times-Picayune) Baton Rouge, La., May 11.—Governor James A. Noe today spent his last full day in the chief executive's office receiving many callers and gifts and watching the convening of the biennial session of the Legislature, in the Senate of which he will sit as a member after the inauguration Tuesday of Governor-Elect Richard W. Leche.

With him most of the day were his wife; his mother, Mrs. Belle McRae Noe; his 12-year-old daughter, Miss Gay Noe, and his son, James A. Noe, Jr. Among the personal gifts presented to Governor and Mrs. Noe was a chest of silver, which included 433 pieces of Bienville pattern, and matching hollow ware in the style of the 17th century. The chest was the gift of Ouachita parish friends, who were represented at the presentation by Barlow Inabnet of Monroe.

Presentation Delayed The presentation was scheduled for 11 a. m., but no one could open the chest at the time. Because it was necessary to call a locksmith to the

governor's office, the ceremony was deferred to 2 p. m. Inscription on the face of the chest is the following: "Presented to Honorable James A. Noe, governor of Louisiana, one of Louisiana's greatest and most progressive governors, by his friends, May 11, 1935."

Speaking for the Ouachita parish committee, Mr. Inabnet said he felt that the governor's "re" in no wise has been vacant since the death of the late Governor O. K. Allen.

"Because we feel that the office has been very well filled and that Governor Noe has been one of the most progressive and st governors we have had," said Mr. Inabnet, "we offer this gift as a token of our love and friendship, and hope that the governor and his family will receive much pleasure from it."

Governor Noe replied that the gift was doubly appreciated because it came at the time of his going out of office instead of his induction, as the usual occasion for gifts. "I hope and think there will still be some Jimmie Noes around here 100 years from now," he continued, "and they will have this chest as proof of your friendship and esteem."

Mrs. James A. Noe, whom he called "Sir Boss," declared the gift would prove expensive. "I'm going to make my husband build a house that will be fitting to keep it in," she said.

Under the chairmanship of P. M. Atkins, the Ouachita citizens' committee was composed of Paul Fink, Murray Hudson and C. L. Munholland.

A. L. SHUSHAN IS MUCH IMPROVED

No Operation Until Further Observation, Asserts Doctor

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The condition of A. L. Shushan, former president of the Orleans levee board, who was stricken in Baton Rouge Monday with what appeared to be acute appendicitis and was then rushed with a motorcycle escort to Hotel Dieu, was said at the hospital late in the day to be "much improved."

"He has the appearance of appendicitis," Dr. Louis Levy, attending physician, said Monday night. "His condition is much improved, however, and we do not contemplate an operation tonight and will not operate, if at all, until further observation."

Mr. Shushan became suddenly ill at the state house in Baton Rouge and was taken to a hotel. There, a physician ordered that he be removed immediately to a hospital. Accompanied by motorcycle police, an ambulance bearing Mr. Shushan reached Hotel Dieu at 2:15 p. m. Dr. Levy and other physicians started consultations immediately.

Mr. Shushan had gone to Baton Rouge to attend the opening Monday of the biennial session of the Louisiana Legislature and to participate in the inauguration today of Governor-Elect Richard W. Leche.

NOE SEEKS HOLIDAY IN MEMORY OF LONG

Governor Asks Legislature to Set Aside Aug. 30 in Last Official Act

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(By International News Service) Baton Rouge, La., May 11.—The last official act of Governor James A. Noe was to enter a measure commemorating the memory of Huey P. Long before the regular session of the Legislature which convened at noon today.

The measure will provide for an annual legal holiday on the late senator's birthday, August 30. It also provides for the closing of all public schools.

Noe's first official act in the gubernatorial seat had been the appointment of Mrs. Huey P. Long to fill the senatorial seat of her husband.

Chief Justice Charles A. O'Neill of the Louisiana supreme court, returning to his office Monday in the civil courts building after attending the American Law Institute in Washington, D. C., said that he will resume his duties as presiding justice of the court on May 25, the next formal decision day.

Although he has been at his office almost daily, Chief Justice O'Neill has not sat on the bench in nearly three months because of illness. Senior Associate Justice John R. Land, Sr., has presided over the court in his absence.

Chief Justice O'Neill said that the American Law Institute was attended by the chief justices of practically every state supreme court in the country as well as other judges and scores of attorneys. Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes of the United States supreme court delivered the principal address at the three-day institute.
