"The appointment was made by P. B. S. Pinchback, who signs the commission as acting governor of the state of Louisiana. Was he acting sovernor of the state? We have no doubt of the fact. He was elected prosident of the Senate in December, 1871, after the death of Lieutenant Governor Dunn. As such he became lieutenant governor during the unexpired term of Oscar J. Dunn. Section 1560 of the Digest of the Statutes of this state provides that 'in case of the vacancy in the office of governor, the lieutenant-governor shall be governor, the Senate shall cleet a prosident, who shall be lieutenant-governor hall be shall be lieutenant-governor. Yage 142.

"The law does not say during his sonatorial term, but that he shall be lieutenant-governor. It he governor had died or resigned the day after, the lieutenant-governor would have become governor. Can it be protended that un-

the eignitish year, died Indirectly. Landry was a member of the State Senate for several terms and in the Constitutional Convention of 1879 he was the Republican candidate for president, receiving twenty-seven votes to 194 for L. A.
