

Pinchback, Carpetbag Negro Governor, Buried

The body of Pinckney Benton Stewart Pinchback, one-time negro lieutenant governor and acting governor of Louisiana for a short period during carpetbag days, who died in Washington, D. C., Wednesday, arrived in New Orleans at 12:45 Sunday and was taken immediately from the L and N. station to the private tomb of the Pinchback family for burial.

There was no funeral ceremonies, church services or ecclesiastical rites, and the burial was a private one, witnessed only by a few relatives and very close friends of the family.

The body was accompanied to New Orleans by Walter Pinchback, a son, and Eugene Tumor, grandson. The following accompanied the body from the train to the station and with the train to the cemetery and witnessed the burial: J. R. Craig, Walter L. Cohen, James B. Hall, F. O. Miss, Alexander Paul, Miss Lulu Keppert, Mrs. John Keppert and Miss Willie Stewart.
