

LONG SUED AGAIN BY MRS. PLEASANT; \$250,000 SOUGHT

'Terror' Actions to Intimidate Tax-Raise Opponents Charged

(Special to The Times-Picayune) Baton Rouge, La., June 10.—Senator Huey P. Long was sued for another \$250,000 damages today by Mrs. Anne Ector Pleasant, wife of former Governor Ruffin G. Pleasant, in a supplemental petition to her original suit asking for \$250,000 for alleged slander, defamation of character and other damages.

The new suit was based on an interview with Senator Long, published in the Baton Rouge State Times, along with other afternoon newspapers in the state, on June 15, 1932, the day after according to allegations in the original suit, Senator Long had ordered Mrs. Pleasant ejected from the office of the state supervisor of public accounts, Miss Alice Lee Grosjean.

The State Times, according to the supplemental petition filed today, quoted the senator as saying that he, the senator, "went up there to keep the officers from putting her in jail." The petition alleges that Senator Long was referring to Mrs. Pleasant and that the utterances were "scandalous, malicious and defamatory of your petitioner's good name, credit and reputation and done with intention of injuring your petitioner in the estimation of her friends, neighbors, acquaintances and the public generally; and that by reason of which she has been so injured and damaged in the full sum of an additional \$250,000."

The text of the amended petition follows: "To the honorable judges of the 19th Judicial District court in and for the parish of East Baton Rouge, state of Louisiana;

"The supplemental and amended petition of Anne Ector Pleasant, wife of Ruffin G. Pleasant, both residents of Caddo parish, state of Louisiana, with respect represents:

"1. That, at or about the time referred to in the original petition, June 15, 1932, your petitioner was attending tax hearings at the state capitol, making speeches and otherwise opposing the enormous raise in taxes which was being advocated by the defendant Huey P. Long, Junior; that her defense of the rights, property and happiness of the people of this state was annoying and irritating to the said Long; and that she verily believes, and, therefore, asserts, that his attempt to intimidate her and prevent her from obtaining record information that was damaging to his administration while governor of the state and to that of his successor, which he seems absolutely to control, was a part of general scheme to terrorize any person or organization that might appear in Baton Rouge to oppose his tax grinding program.

"2. That, in a purported interview given in the city of Baton Rouge by the said Huey P. Long, Jr., for publication in the State Times, a newspaper domiciled and published in the parish of East Baton Rouge, and circulated in the said parish and other parts of the state of Louisiana, said interview being published in the said newspaper and circulated in said parish and state on Thursday, June 16, 1932, the said Huey P. Long, Jr., is quoted as saying, and I verily believe, and, therefore, assert that he said, that he 'went up there, meaning the office of Miss Alice Lee Grosjean, supervisor of public accounts of the state and on the occasion referred to in the original petition, 'to keep the officers from putting her, meaning your petitioner, 'in jail,' that the said assertion by the said Long, was fictitious, malicious, infamous, damaging, libelous and injurious to your petitioner's good name and reputation, and was made with the intention of injuring, and did injure, her said reputation with her friends, neighbors and acquaintances, and with the public in general; that she had committed any act whatever to give officers of the law any grounds to arrest her or incarcerate her in jail; that the said Huey P. Long had no authority whatever to prevent her arrest if she had been guilty of any crime, and no authority to order an arrest in any event; and that his sole object was evidently to attempt to strike terror to your petitioner as a tax opponent through the use of the hostile presence of several of his henchmen, the physical force of one of them, and the threatened violence of all, as evidenced by the fact that some persons who intended to speak against the burdensome tax raises were thugs whom Long dominated, and the waylaying and knocking into insensibility of one, Joseph Boudreaux, who was energetically opposing the imposition of more burdensome taxation upon the insolvent, disheartened and oppressed people of the state.

"Charges Conspiracy "3. That he, the said Huey P. Long, Jr., further said in said interview that, when he 'went up there to keep the officers from putting her, meaning your petitioner, 'in jail,' he did so after he had 'received a telephone call to come up there,' that your petitioner verily believes, and so asserts, that the said telephone call was given or ordered by his political and bosom friend, ally and beneficiary, Miss Alice Lee Grosjean, supervisor of public accounts, and that they, therefore, had entered into a conspiracy to have your petitioner seized to prevent her from making inquiries and investigations in the interest of the taxpayers, of which she was one.

"4. That the said utterances by the said Long 'that he went up

there to keep the officers from putting her, meaning your petitioner, 'in jail,' was scandalous, malicious and defamatory of your petitioner's good name, credit and reputation, and done with the intent of injuring your petitioner in the esteem of her friends, neighbors and acquaintances, and the public generally; and that, by reason of which, she has been so injured and damaged in the full sum of an additional \$250,000.

Therefore, premises considered, petitioner prays that she have leave to file this amended and supplemental petition; that a copy of same, together with citation, be served upon the defendant in accordance with law; and that, in due course, she have judgment in her favor and against the said defendant in the full sum of \$250,000 damages as alleged herein, with legal interest thereon from judicial demand, in addition to the amount prayed for in the original petition.

Mrs. Pleasant asks for costs and general and equitable relief.

DELEGATES PLEDGED FOR REPEAL ELECTED (By The Associated Press) Reno, Nev., June 10.—Forty delegates pledged for repeal of the prohibition law were elected in county conventions today to attend a state convention on September 5 and formally vote Nevada's ratification of the 21st Amendment.

Not a single dry delegate was elected in the entire state. Nomination and election of anti-prohibition delegates were by acclamation in nearly every county and all gatherings were marked by complete harmony.

BLAZE IN ARIZPA HOLD CONQUERED BY PORT FORCES

Mobile Craft Reaches Boston Harbor Under Convoy

(By The Associated Press) Boston, June 10.—Fire in a hold of the freighter Arizpa, bound from Mobile, Ala., to Bremen, Germany, was brought under control in Boston harbor today at the conclusion of a 450-mile run from sea. The fire had burned for 70 hours in the \$800,000 cargo of cotton, resin and lumber, being confined chiefly to the cotton.

Two of the crew suffered injuries while fighting the fire. George M. Quinn, first engineer, was struck by a jet of live steam, which was used in combating the blaze. W. C. Horwig, chief engineer, suffered a possible ankle fracture in a fall.

Youth Rescued A Mobile high school pupil, A. J. Harris, who was working his way on the Arizpa, was saved from death by Henry B. Smith, boatswain, after he had tumbled down a ventilator hatch.

With a bowline about his waist and carrying a steam line, Smith went down the ventilator and tied another bowline around the youth. Both were hauled to safety. Five passengers, who experienced

a thrilling time, were: S. C. Pierston, Troy, Ala.; J. B. Garmaney, Chattanooga, Tenn.; J. C. Murphy, Troy, Ala.; Carlhas Barth, Dusseldorf, Germany, and John Fornville, Montgomery, Ala.

Arrives Under Convoy With fireboats alongside the work of completely extinguishing the fire progressed. When the vessel, under convoy of the Coast Guard destroyer Wainwright and cutter Mojave, arrived here its deck plates were so hot firemen could not traverse them.

The Arizpa is an American flag vessel of more than 5000 gross tons and is owned by the Waterman Steamship Company of Mobile. It was built in 1,20 for the American shipping board.

Captain Lund said the damaged portion of his cargo would be unloaded here over the week-end and he expected to resume his trip to Germany Monday.

LONG SAYS MAGAZINE CONTROL ADMITTED

Senator Discusses Lamont Questioning on Publication Policy

(By The Associated Press) Washington, June 10.—Senator Huey P. Long, Democrat, Louisiana, said in the Senate today that Thomas W. Lamont, Morgan partner, had admitted that J. P. Morgan and Company controlled Collier's Weekly, magazine which recently published an article criticizing the Louisiana senator.

Lamont denied under questioning by Long at the Morgan hearing that he had an influence in the editorial policy of the publication. Long said Collier's in 1930 printed

an article "lauding me" and that after "I recently assailed the house of Morgan the same writer wrote another article which pictured me as an entirely different man, physically, mentally and morally."

The Louisiana senator then read from a magazine article which he attributed to Bernard Baruch. Written in 1928, Long said the article showed the fallacy of Baruch's economic views, "which I have been assailed for criticizing."

KABUS ON FIRST VISIT TO CITY IN 26 YEARS Fernand Kabus, internationally known gastronomist and vice-president of Angostura Bitters of London, Paris and New York, was a visitor in New Orleans Saturday. The visit was his first here in 26 years.

Mr. Kabus is on his way to Chicago, where he will deliver an address on gastronomic art of ancient and modern times. He was

highly impressed with the development of New Orleans as a business center since his last visit here.
