WINTER WHEAT
OF A SUPERIOR QUALITY—FOR SALE AT
VAUGHAN & AGRY'S STORE.
 THIS kind of Wheat was first sown by the Sub-
 scriber about 17 years since, and has not depreciated
 since it was first sown. It ripens about a week
 earlier than common grain, is plump, has a thin skin,
 gives very white flour, and has yielded 30 pounds to
 a bushel. The straw is stout and the ears long.
 Winter Wheat succeeds best on burnt ground, but
 also succeeds well on a free mellow soil, if in good
 heart; and that has a gradual slope is best for it.
 On burnt ground 1 bushel of seed to the acre is suffi-
 cient. On ploughed land 2 bushels to the acre, unless
 sown on or before the 12th August—when 7 pecks
 may answer. Winter Wheat ought not to be sown
 after the 1st September. The land should be rolled
 when the Wheat is sown, and early in the Spring.
