didate, Mesrs, Roman and Hamilton, who obtained the greater number of votes at the election in August last. Air. Previous to the balloting, Mr. Hamilton addressed a note to the members of both Houses, withdrawing himself

from a competition. Mr. Roman was almost unanimously chosen Governor of the State for

the term of four years.
The imperfect arrangements for the accommodation of the Legislature at Donaldson, led to the introduction of a bill to transfer the seat of government to New Orleans, which was patsed and approved by the Governor.
