

**EX-GOVERNOR WICKLIFFE IN PRISON.**—A New Orleans letter says: Among the "prisoners" in this city is ex-Governor Wickliffe, who was captured on his plantation by a body of Federal soldiers, on the advance to Port Hudson. The Governor has the liberty of the city, and has not yet been able to discover why he is a prisoner. It may be stated, however, that his plantation is near Bayou Sara, and not very far from Port Hudson, and that there are no persons on the place excepting Mr. Wickliffe's daughter, a young lady of seventeen, and his mother-in-law, Mrs. General Dawson. He does not know whether there are any of his negroes now on his estate, but he does know that there are hundreds of armed negroes in and about Port Hudson, and he is naturally anxious respecting the unprotected condition of his family and property.
