An Abominable Fraud, practised by Tobacco Planters.

The inspectors of tobacco for this port, upon inspecting a lot of tobacco, on the 12th of last month, brought to this city by Messrs. Bruton and Simpson, and consigned to Messrs. Bredlove, Bradford & Robeson, found eleven hogheads with heads from four to seven inches thick, made of green oak timber; the staves from one and a half to two inches thick; on weighing the heading of one of the hogheads it was found to be 194 lbs. and the remaining eleven were of similar dimensions. Ten hds. of the above were marked C. S. and one R. S.; the planters' names are Charles Simons and R. Simpson, residing in Sumner County, Tennessee.
