of the Mississippi Territory, has been nominated by the President, Commissioner on the part of the United States, to receive Louisiana from the French. Although no direct allasion is made to the possibility of any obstacles being opposed to this measure, it is hinted, that as the Spanlards have evinced a disposition for subterfuge and prevarication, the appointment of such a character as Mr. Claiborne, who is rather boisterous in his deportment, is not calculated to conciliate the already irritated temper of the Dons.
