

INSULTED BY LONG, DECLARES FORMER GOVERNOR'S WIFE

Mrs. Pleasant Says Senator
Called Her 'Drunken,
Cursing Woman'

Baton Rouge, La., June 15.—The charge that she was insulted and threatened with ejection from the new capitol today by Senator Huey P. Long was made tonight in a statement issued by Mrs. Ruffin G. Pleasant, wife of former Governor Pleasant.

Mrs. Pleasant, in her statement, alleges that she was seized by the arm by R. L. Whitman, superintendent of the Louisiana state bureau of identification and investigation, at the command of Senator Long while she was in the reception room of the office of Miss Alice Lee Grosjean, state supervisor of public accounts.

Senator Long, according to Mrs. Pleasant's statement, accused her of being "a drunken and cursing woman" when she demanded to know what right he had to put a taxpayer out of the capitol.

Mrs. Pleasant, in her statement, said she challenged Senator Long to prove by any citizen in any place in Louisiana that a curse had ever passed her lips or that she had ever drunk any kind of liquor in her life. "This outrageous performance of Senator Long," Mrs. Pleasant asserted, "was simply a deliberate frame-up in an attempt to intimidate me and discourage me in my efforts to obtain information in connection with the records of Louisiana State university."

"Shortly after I arrived at this office, Senator Huey P. Long walked in and entered Miss Grosjean's private office."

"In a few minutes Senator Long came out of the private office, and Senator Long looked at me and said: 'Seize that woman and put her out of the capitol.'"

"I demanded to know what right Senator Long had to put a taxpayer out of the capitol, a citizen who was seeking legitimate information. Whitman released his hold on my arm."

"Senator Long said: 'I can't have a drunken, cursing woman in the capitol.'"

"I challenged Senator Long to prove by any citizen in any place in Louisiana that a curse had ever passed her lips or that I ever had drunk any kind of liquor in my life."

"Senator Long roughly and loudly repeated his untrue and insulting remarks. With his hands cupped over his mouth he 'boomed' at me like a hoodlum."

"I told Senator Long I would not leave the office. Senator Long screamed at me: 'Stay in here, little one, but if she curses any more put her out.'"

"Senator Long then got into an elevator. Whitman and several other men who also came out of Miss Grosjean's private office followed him down in an elevator a short while later."

"I remained in the office a few minutes to show them I was not afraid, and then left, going to the main floor of the capitol, where I told some of my friends of the indignity I had suffered at Senator Long's hands."

"I returned to the office of the state supervisor of public accounts and talked pleasantly to several employees in that office, asking them to smelt my breath to show that Senator Long was prevaricating as usual."

"I again went down to the main floor of the capitol, attended different public hearings by legislative committees and talked to many men and women."

"This outrageous performance of Senator Long was simply a deliberate frame-up in an attempt to intimidate me and discourage me in my efforts to obtain any damaging evidence from the records of this administration."

"This man Whitman who seized me today at Senator Long's command is the same Whitman who was accused of seizing and carrying away Sam Irby and James Terrell, former husband of Miss Alice Lee Grosjean, in Shreveport about two years ago."

"I cannot see any reason for a citizen who is not a state officer attempting to put another citizen out of the state house. I cannot understand why any state officer should obey the commands of Senator Long."

AGREEMENT MADE FOR WITHDRAWAL OF WORKER BILLS

Compensation Legislation
Held Up Until 1934
Session

Baton Rouge, La., June 15.—Agreements were reached this afternoon whereby all workmen's compensation legislation now before the Louisiana Legislature will be withdrawn.

The bills will be withdrawn, it was announced, with the understanding that similar legislation will be offered at the 1934 session of the Legislature if business conditions have improved sufficiently by that time.

The agreements to withdraw the measures were reached when they were taken up at meetings of the House and Senate committees on capital and labor.

The one Senate bill, introduced by Senator J. J. Wingrave of New Orleans, was given an unfavorable report, and it was decided to report four similar House bills without action with the understanding that they will be withdrawn.

Limits Women's Employment
The House bills were introduced by Representatives August Mayewski of New Orleans, S. Allen Bordelon of Avoyelles, William E. Weber and Peter A. Hand, New Orleans.

The House committee reported favorably by a vote of six to four a bill introduced by Representative Jesse F. Lucas of Rapides parish to limit the employment of women to eight hours a day and 48 hours a week. The present law limits employment to nine hours a day and 60 hours a week.

The bill was amended in committee to exempt from its provisions emergency employment in caring for perishable products.

The committee gave a favorable report to the bill by Representative Joseph Weber of Orleans to require the licensing of all cleaning establishments by the state fire marshal. The bill was first amended in committee to make it applicable only in municipalities of more than 10,000 population.

Wage Scale Bill Approved
By a vote of nine to two, the committee approved a bill by Representative W. J. B. Chandler of Cade to compel contractors on public works to pay the prevailing wage scales and by a vote of five to four approved a bill by Representative Joseph Weber requiring examination of motion picture operators in municipalities of more than 10,000 population. The bill was amended in committee to provide that examinations would not be required of motion picture operators who have been engaged for five years or more and have been qualified electors for that period.

The House committee then without opposition unanimously approved a bill by Senators Gove D. Davis of La Salle and A. C. Gardiner of Acadia fixing the minimum scale for laborers on public works at 30 cents an hour.

North Louisiana
Citizens Attack
Electric Rates

Figures Excessive, Says Protest to Public Service Body

Baton Rouge, La., June 15.—North Louisiana citizens today protested to the Louisiana Public Service Commission against Louisiana Power and Light Company rates that they described as "excessive and exorbitant," and asked that after hearing the rates be fixed at half the present schedule.

The petition was presented in the name of citizens of Mer Rouge, Oak Grove, Rayville, Forest, Darnell, Epps and other cities and towns of the northern section of the state. The petition complained that the generating cost of electricity distributed by the company was 1 cent per kilowatt hour, and the consumer charge eight cents. Discrimination was charged in the claim that the company sold gas wholesale at 15 cents per 1000 feet, and charged 50 cents from industrial users, and 75 cents from domestic users.

The commission docketed the complaint.

MUNICIPAL COURTS BILL HEARING NEARS

Vic Seht Heads Grand
Jurors' Committee at
Baton Rouge

A committee representing the Orleans Parish Grand Jurors' Association will appear before the legislative committee at Baton Rouge which is considering the bill creating a system of municipal courts for New Orleans at a hearing scheduled at 8 o'clock tonight.

The committee is headed by Vic Seht and includes Paul E. Lacourge, J. H. Menge, George Testard, Denis W. Keene. The committee was named by William Pfaff, president of the association. It conferred with Mayor T. Semmes Walmsley during the past week.

As a result of this conference Mayor Walmsley requested Representative Gilbert J. Fortier to introduce the bill replacing the recorder courts with municipal courts having experienced attorneys as judges.

NO HURRY ON TICK, FUNDS, FRANCHISE BILLS, SAYS DORE

Senate Finance Group Gets
Two Measures Passed
by House

Baton Rouge, La., June 15.—The Lester-Letissier bill to raise funds for tick eradication work and the administration corporation franchise bill were referred to the Senate finance committee under a suspension of the rules this morning. Both of the bills were passed by the House of Representatives Tuesday night.

Senator J. Hugo Dore of Evangeline parish, chairman of the finance committee, said this afternoon that he had not fixed a date for the hearing of the two bills.

"I'm not in any hurry to take them up," Mr. Dore said. "I want to clear my calendar of Senate bills first."

The Lester-Letissier bill, which was passed by a vote of 58 to 39 nays, in the House, levies a tax on the dairy and live stock industries

and butter substitutes. It has been estimated that the tax will yield between \$400,000 and \$500,000 a year.

The corporation franchise tax, the fifth administration tax bill introduced during the current session, levies \$1.25 per thousand on the capital stock, surplus and undivided profits of business enterprises. The House vote on this bill was 62 yeas to 28 nays.

48,000 PERSONS USE
AUDUBON PARK POOL
More than 48,000 persons have used the Audubon Park natorium since its opening for the season on May 5, according to a report issued Wednesday by Harry L. Falk, chairman of the Audubon Park Commission's natorium committee.

Following a rule adopted a year ago, high school and college students have been admitted to the natorium for 10 cents each, with the result that more than 5000 persons in this class have enjoyed the privileges of the pool at a nominal charge. The general attendance of men and women has been better than 28,000 combined.
