Richard II. Taylor thus writes to the Frankfort Yeomon as to the marriage of Jefferson Davis: In order to correct the many allly stories about the first marriage of President Jeff. Davis, I will give you the facts. In the first clace they never ran off. Mr. Davis married Miss Sarah Knox Taylor at the residence of her father's eldest sister (Mrs. Gibson Tavlor), pear Louisville, and with her father's consent. Ceremony performed by the Rev. Mr. Ash, of the Episcopal Church, a number of near relations and friends being present among the former Hancock Taylor, her father eldest brother, and relatives living here. The Hon. Pollock Barbour, now living at the home of Mrs. Paylor, was also an eve-witness. In the next place, Mr. Davis never was at Fort Winnebaco, and General Taylor was never there but once, when he went with troops to the relief of the fort, which was then threatened by the Indians. Mr. and Mrs. Davis left for then home in Mississpoi immediately after their

marriage, and she lived only about six months.

FFERSON DAVIS'S MARRIAGE. - Colonel
